### **ASPIRES** and Graduation

- Considerable progress in defining what graduation means for OVC programs – but is it sustainable?
- Limited data on sustainability of householdlevel outcomes after graduation. In response:
  - We turned to implementing partners to learn from their experiences
  - We collaborated with 4Children to conduct a qualitative sub-study of a large tracer study assessing sustainability of an OVC program in Kenya









# Implementer Insights

- Design
  - 7 KIIs with OVC implementers across Africa
  - What are the features of a program that make its outcomes sustainable?
  - What are household characteristics most associated with resilience or backsliding after graduation?

# Implementer Insights

- Findings
  - Many of the households at risk of backsliding are those in our target groups
  - Responsible graduation is important but not always practiced
  - ES is important but not all participants receive interventions
  - Suggestions for sustainability: partnering with local institutions and pairing resilience-building and social support interventions









## **Retrospective Research**

#### Design

- Qualitative follow-up to 4Children's tracer study in Kenya
- 59 IDIs with backslider and sustainers and 4 KIIs with implementers
- Thematic analysis and qualitative comparative analysis

## Findings

- Backsliding was common
- ES seen as important to sustainability, but no one intervention came out as key in QCA
- Dependency and dosage issues
- Social/intra-household issues
- Can all households graduate?









# **Making Sense and Next Steps**

- ES matters as part of comprehensive package, but it may be overshadowed by high clinical targets and budget constraints
- Sustainability is linked to addressing social/intra-household and economic issues
- Not everyone will graduate
- Building economic capacity takes time and investment
